THE MASTER OF DESTINATION

How Brother Aquan Robinson Aligns Professional Expertise with Regional Leadership to Architect the Future of Alpha Gatherings

Leadership is rarely about occupying a space; it is about architecting an experience. For the men of Alpha Upsilon Lambda (AUL), excellence is not a distant goal—it is the baseline. But when professional brilliance seamlessly intersects with fraternal service, the result is nothing short of masterwork.

Enter Brother Aquan Robinson.

Professionally, he serves as the Senior Director of Destination Development and Sales at Experience Montgomery, a division of the Montgomery Regional Chamber. Fraternally, he has stepped into the powerful seat of Time and Place Chair for the Southern Region of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., while maintaining his vital role as Director of Conferences for the District of Alabama.

The AUL sat down with Brother Robinson to discuss his high-level appointment, the economic power of the "Alpha Dollar," and how the culture of Montgomery's historic alumni chapter prepared him to shape the convention experience for thousands of Alphas across the South.

Part I: *The Intersection of Profession and Fraternity*

THE AUL: As Senior Director of Destination Development and Sales, you sell the city of Montgomery to the world. How does that professional lens change the way you view the logistics of the Southern Region?

BROTHER AQUAN ROBINSON: For me, these roles naturally align because both are rooted in the same philosophy: creating meaningful experiences. At Experience Montgomery, my responsibility is shaping how visitors experience our city. That identical mindset carries directly into my work within Alpha. Whether I'm positioning Montgomery on the global stage or planning massive gatherings for the Brotherhood, I am always analyzing the experience from beginning to end. I want people to arrive and instantly feel connected—to the place, to the brothers around them, and to something bigger than themselves.

THE AUL: What specific skills from the Chamber of Commerce world do you plan to "import" into the Time and Place Committee to elevate the regional convention experience?

BROTHER ROBINSON: Relationship building, strategic planning, and destination storytelling. When I evaluate host cities for the Southern Region, I don't just look at hotel room blocks or meeting space square footage. I look at infrastructure, civic partnerships, walkability, transit options, local culture, and the overall narrative of the city. My goal is to import that corporate rigor into the fraternity to create gatherings that feel entirely seamless while maximizing opportunities for fellowship, networking, mentorship, and community impact.



THE AUL: How does being the "Director of Destination" professionally align with being the "Director of Destination" for thousands of Alphas across the South?

BROTHER ROBINSON: It bridges the gap between logistical execution and fraternal purpose. In both worlds, destination development is an extension of service. It's about understanding what a community needs to thrive and what an attendee needs to feel inspired. By viewing the Southern Region through this professional lens, I can ensure our conventions are not just events on a calendar, but premier, world-class destinations that reflect the excellence of Alpha Phi Alpha.

Part II: *Vision for the Southern Region*

THE AUL: When scouting a "Time and Place" for the Southern Region, what are the "non-negotiables" you look for in a host city to ensure the Brotherhood is well-served?

BROTHER ROBINSON: It boils down to accessibility, structural capacity, and local synergy. First, the infrastructure must be flawless—hotels and convention centers must effortlessly accommodate our scale. Second, walkability and safety are paramount; the layout must foster organic brotherhood and easy connection. Third, there must be a strong local willingness to partner with us. A host city must be ready to embrace Alpha, not just book our business.

THE AUL: Regional conventions are massive undertakings. Do you have a specific vision for modernizing or "refreshing" the Southern Region's convention footprint during your tenure?

BROTHER ROBINSON: Tradition matters deeply, especially within Alpha, but tradition should never be an excuse for stagnation. My vision is to make the experience feel more engaging and deeply connected to our surroundings. I want brothers to truly experience the cities we visit instead of simply sitting in meetings and leaving. Every destination has a unique story, and part of my responsibility is integrating that local flavor and history directly into the convention footprint.

THE AUL: Alpha conventions bring massive revenue to host cities. How do you plan to leverage this "Alpha Dollar" to ensure our presence benefits the communities we visit?

BROTHER ROBINSON: Economic impact is a powerful leverage tool. Professionally, I analyze the millions of dollars conventions inject into local economies. When Alpha shows up, we create massive economic activity through hotels, restaurants, transportation, and local attractions. My plan is to intentionally direct that "Alpha Dollar" toward small, minority-owned, and Black-owned businesses in our host cities. We must build strong, reciprocal partnerships ensuring that when Alpha leaves a city, that community is measurably better off than it was before we arrived.

Part III: *Roots and Representation: The AUL Connection*

THE AUL: Montgomery's Alpha Upsilon Lambda is a chapter steeped in history. How has the mentorship and culture within AUL prepared you for regional leadership?

BROTHER ROBINSON: Alpha Upsilon Lambda is my foundation. The mentorship, fierce accountability, and rich culture within AUL taught me early on that leadership is never about prestige—it is strictly about service. The giants in our chapter showed me how to carry myself, how to execute with precision, and how to protect the brand of Alpha. That exact foundation shapes how I walk into corporate boardrooms and regional committee meetings alike.

THE AUL: Does having a Montgomery-based brother in this seat provide a unique opportunity to showcase the "Cradle of the Confederacy turned Birthplace of Civil Rights" to the wider region?

BROTHER ROBINSON: Absolutely. Montgomery carries one of the most critical and complex narratives in American history. From the painful realities of the past to the transformative triumphs of the Civil Rights Movement, the work of the Equal Justice Initiative, and the Southern Poverty Law Center, our city is constantly evolving. Being based here allows me to bring a deeply rooted perspective to the region—showing how a city can honor its history while aggressively moving forward.

THE AUL: What does your appointment say to the younger brothers of AUL about the importance of aligning one's professional career with their service to the House of Alpha?

BROTHER ROBINSON: I hope it serves as a proof of concept. I want younger brothers to see that your profession and your fraternal service do not have to exist in separate silos; they can feed one another. The skills you sharpen in your day job can become the exact tools you use to elevate the Brotherhood. When you align your passion with your purpose, your service to Alpha becomes natural, impactful, and elite.

Part IV: The Personal Drive

THE AUL: Between the Chamber and the Southern Region, you are essentially managing logistics for two major entities. How do you manage the pressure and the pace?

BROTHER ROBINSON: It requires immense discipline, but honestly, the pressure is mitigated by the passion. When you genuinely love creating spaces for people to connect, the work doesn't feel like a burden. I rely heavily on strategic organization, a circle of trusted brothers and colleagues, and the simple understanding that the pace I keep is serving a grander purpose.



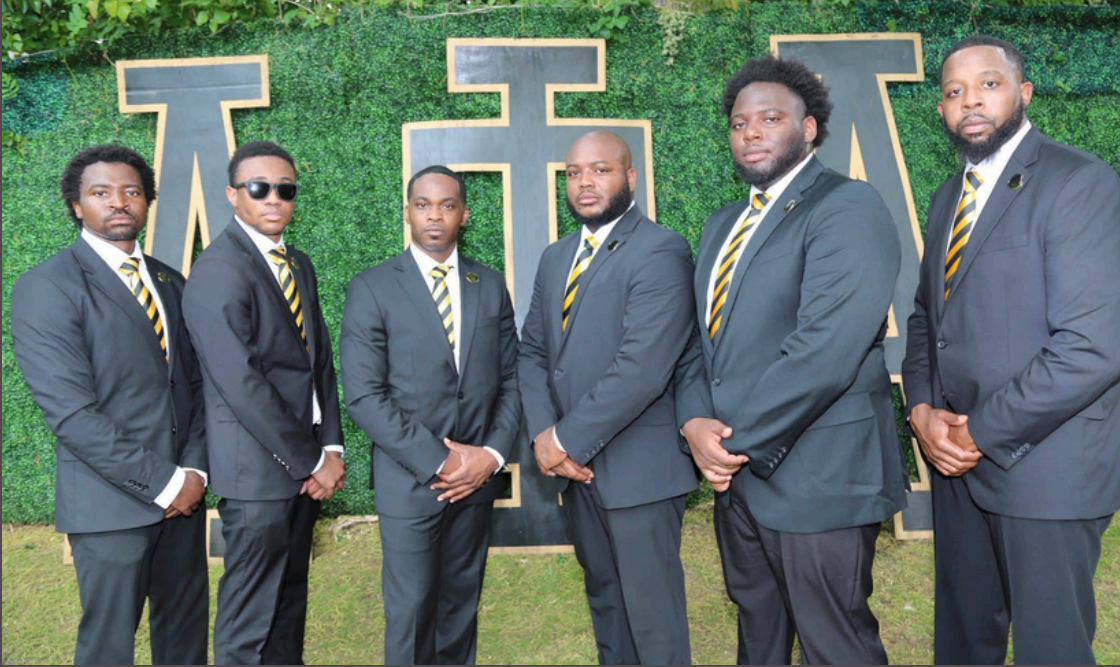
THE AUL: What was the "lightbulb moment" where you realized your passion for hospitality and destination management could be your greatest gift to the Fraternity?

BROTHER ROBINSON: It clicked when I realized that a poorly executed convention disrupts the spirit of fraternity, while a flawlessly executed one enhances it. When logistics are seamless, brothers don't have to worry about long lines, bad transit, or disorganized schedules—they are free to focus entirely on the business of Alpha and the joy of fellowship. That's when I realized my professional gift was the ultimate way to protect and serve the Brotherhood.

THE AUL: When your term as Time and Place Chair is complete, what do you want brothers to say was the "Robinson Hallmark" on our regional gatherings?

BROTHER ROBINSON: "I want them to say the experience felt intentional. I want the legacy to be that every single detail mattered, every city was thoughtfully curated, and every gathering reflected the absolute pinnacle of excellence our Brotherhood represents."

From \$10 to Transformation

The Story Behind 'Better Than Average'

The first time it happened, it looked small—two children at a table, a few worksheets, and ten dollars passed quietly at the end of the afternoon. But for a student who had simply been ahead of the curve, it marked the beginning of something far more enduring: the discovery that helping someone else understand could be just as rewarding as understanding it first.

He remembers those afternoons clearly. His mother worked long hours, and much of his time was spent at his grandmother's house, where opportunity arrived unannounced. A brother and sister nearby needed help, and whether by invitation or instinct, he stepped in. It was informal, almost accidental, the kind of moment that might have passed without consequence. Instead, it stayed.

The money was exciting—ten dollars a session felt significant at the time—but it was not the reason he returned. Convincing his mother to allow it had been its own negotiation, especially given the circumstances. Yet what lingered was not the risk or even the reward. It was the feeling. What began as "playing teacher" quickly settled into something more substantial: a sense of purpose that was difficult to name, but impossible to ignore.



That sense sharpened in the magnet school environment where he spent his formative years. Surrounded by peers who took their work seriously, he encountered a different standard—one that quietly redefined his own expectations.

Excellence was not exceptional there; it was routine. And once seen consistently, it became difficult to accept anything less.

That experience now shapes the foundation of his work. At Better Than Average Tutoring, the goal extends beyond assignments and immediate results. It is about exposure—introducing students to a level of discipline and achievement they may not encounter elsewhere, and trusting that, over time, they will begin to reflect it. The premise is simple, but demanding: when students see what “better” looks like often enough, they begin to believe it is within reach.

The name itself carries a dual meaning. “Better Than Average” is both an expectation and a quiet provocation. It reflects the standard instilled in him early on—where complacency was never an option—and challenges an industry often content with short-term fixes.

Rather than focusing solely on catching students up, his approach aims deeper, building the kind of academic foundation that allows them, eventually, to move forward on their own. The result is not just improvement, but trust—earned slowly, and sustained through outcomes families can see.

The Origin Story

Do you remember the first student you helped? What made you want to keep going?

Yes, I actually do. Growing up, my mom worked all the time, so I spent a lot of afternoons at my grandmother’s house. I was in the magnet program, so I was often working ahead of my peers. There were two kids—a brother and a sister—who needed help, and I either got pulled in or naturally stepped in to support them.

I remember earning about \$10 per session, and I was excited about that, but it took a lot to even get my mom to approve it—especially accepting money and being inside a stranger’s house without her supervision. What stuck with me most, though, was how much I enjoyed it. It felt like “playing teacher,” but it also gave me a sense of purpose. Looking back, that was the first moment I realized I enjoyed helping others grow.

How did the magnet school environment shape your understanding of what students need?

Being in the magnet school system was a game changer for me. I grew up in an environment where not everyone valued education, so being surrounded by students who took it seriously forced me to rise to a higher standard. More importantly, it showed me what “good” looks like. When you consistently see excellence, it becomes your norm. That experience shaped how I work with students today—we don’t just teach content at Better Than Average Tutoring, we expose students to a higher standard so they can begin to mirror it themselves.

Philosophy & Brand

Is “Better Than Average” a standard or a challenge to traditional tutoring?

It’s both. “Better Than Average” is the standard we set for our students, and it’s also the standard that was set for me growing up. My mom never allowed complacency—there was always more to do, more to strive for, and more to push for.

At the same time, it’s a challenge to traditional tutoring. A lot of tutoring models focus on helping students get through homework or keep up in class. While that has value, it often doesn’t address the root of the issue. Our approach is different. We focus on building the foundation so students can eventually become independent learners. Ironically, that doesn’t hurt our business—it builds trust. When families see real results, they stay and refer others.

Is tutoring more about academics or belief in oneself?

It’s both, but confidence is the foundation. Once a student believes in themselves, the academics become much easier. Of course, they still need support with skills and concepts, but mindset drives performance. It’s like anything in life—if you enjoy what you’re doing, you show up differently. If a student walks in discouraged, they’re not going to give their best effort. But if they walk in confident and encouraged, everything changes. That’s where real growth happens.

The Student-CEO Perspective

What was the hardest part about being a student and CEO?

Honestly, the hardest part wasn't the academics—it was the logistics.

At the time, I was a high school student with no car, trying to make sure I could get to sessions on time while carrying around a large crate full of tutoring materials that my elementary school teacher gave me. On top of that, I had recruited another classmate to help support a few students in the afternoons, so there was an added layer of coordination there as well. There was a lot to manage at that age. But once I found a rhythm, I actually started to enjoy it. I even remember intentionally reserving Wednesdays for myself and not working weekends, which gave me a sense of balance. Looking back, that stands out because these days it often feels like a seven-day operation with very limited "off" time.

How did you make learning fun?

One of my go-to strategies was using sports references.

For example, I'd use athletes like LeBron James to explain concepts, especially with male students. Whether it was math, reading, or problem-solving, tying it back to something they already cared about made it click. It turned learning from something they had to do into something they actually enjoyed.

Impact & Legacy

What advice would CEO LJ give 3rd-grade LJ?

Honestly, I'd say: "Have fun. You have no idea what your future is going to look like." I know myself—if you tell me not to touch the stove, I'm going to touch it anyway because I need to know that it's hot.

So advice probably wouldn't have worked on me in a traditional sense. But that reminder to enjoy the journey? That would have stuck. What should students feel after a session?

Above all, we want students to walk out feeling confident. No matter what happened that day, or what's going on outside of the walls at Better Than Average Tutoring, they should leave believing that they are capable, that they have potential, and that there's greatness in them.

At Better Than Average Tutoring, we want students to feel like they are not just keeping up—they are capable of being exceptional.

As my mom always told me, anything worth having is worth working for.



Father-Son Duo's Unique Perspective on Serving Alpha Side by Side



In Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., the phrase "First of All, Servants of All, We Shall Transcend All" is a guiding light. But for one Montgomery family, it is also a living, breathing reality.

The bond between a father and son is always unique, but Brother Kelvin and Brother Micah have taken theirs to a new dimension.

Kelvin crossed the burning sands into the Alpha Upsilon Lambda (AUL) Alumni Chapter in Montgomery, Alabama, in the Spring of 2025. Just one year later, in the Spring of 2026, his son Micah followed his footsteps into the House of Alpha.

The Foundation: Legacy and Motivation

Kelvin, you made the decision to join Alpha Upsilon Lambda in Spring 2025. What told you it was finally time to cross the burning sands?

Kelvin: My decision was far from impulsive; it was a lifelong goal delayed but never abandoned. I initially began my journey in the spring of 1991 with the Upsilon Eta Chapter at Auburn University at Montgomery. Personal and financial hardships forced me to halt the process back then, but my passion never wavered. After honorably completing my service in both the military and the public school system, I knew the time had come to finish what I started and begin my lifelong work as an Alpha Man.

Micah, growing up, what were your impressions of the fraternity? Did seeing your father's journey with AUL influence your decision to join the following spring?

Micah: Growing up, I didn't knowingly have Alpha men as role models. My mother is a Delta, so Greek life was always around, but my impressions of Alpha really formed during my freshman year at Troy University. I watched how the Alpha men carried themselves on campus. The stereotypes I heard about them were the kind you actually want to live up to, not disprove.

Seeing my dad's journey and his first year of service with AUL absolutely amplified my desire to join. Hearing about his events and the bonds he was creating made the call to service undeniable.

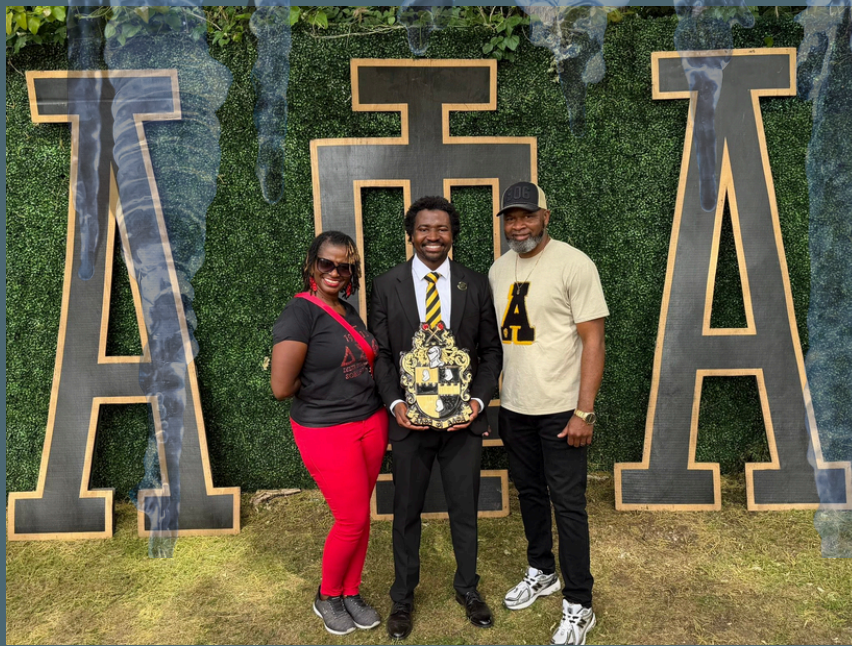
The Bond of Brotherhood

Kelvin, what was your proudest moment watching Micah navigate his own journey into the fraternity just one year after yours?

Kelvin: History repeated itself. Micah started his path at Troy University's Xi Beta Chapter, but his progress was halted by a technicality.

What makes me most proud is the incredible leadership he displayed when he went through the intake process later, and the lasting, positive impact he made on so many brothers along the way.





Now that you are both brothers, has the dynamic of your father-son relationship shifted?

Micah: Honestly, I haven't felt a shift in our dynamic just yet. I think that is something that will naturally happen with time as we grow deeper into the Brotherhood together.

Alpha Phi Alpha emphasizes Manly Deeds and Love for All Mankind. How do you plan to live out those tenets together within AUL?

Kelvin: We want to blend my experience with Micah's contemporary perspective. Side-by-side, we look forward to mentoring youth, championing fitness and wellness among the chapter's brothers, and serving the Montgomery area. Our unique bond allows us to double our impact and stand as an example for other fathers and sons in the community.

Micah: I'm incredibly excited to lead Brothers and the community in fitness alongside my dad. I'm passionate about educating and equipping people to take control of their physical health. We become elevated role models, more present family members, and better servants of all when we are strong and healthy.

From Blazers to Brothers

Micah, you graduated from UAB in 2022. How did your experiences as a Blazer prepare you for the leadership expectations of an Alpha man?

Micah: Going to school in Alabama shaped me in ways I will value forever. As I mature, I see the immense value of being educated in cities that were so vital to the Civil Rights Movement and Black American history. It gives you a deeper sense of responsibility.

Kelvin, what is one piece of "Old Gold" advice you've given Micah about balancing his professional life with his new duties to the fraternity?

Kelvin: I am incredibly proud of Micah's mindset. He often tells me he doesn't want to just be a "t-shirt wearer"—he wants to do the true works of Alpha. My advice to him is to find his specific passions within the fraternity and commit to them fully, but to balance that drive with his daily life. Alpha is a lifelong commitment; paced dedication always beats burning out early.



Lighthearted "Ice Breakers" Who has the better stroll?

Kelvin: I'll be the first to admit Micah has me beat on the dance floor. He definitely got his rhythm from his mother and is by far the better stroller—although he keeps promising he's going to teach me a few moves!

Micah: I definitely stroll better than my dad. You're much more likely to catch me practicing in public, though. I think my dad waits until he's home alone to practice by himself in the mirror.

The Alpha Wardrobe: Micah, have any of your Dad's new AUL polo shirts "mysteriously" migrated to your closet yet?

Micah: No, it's actually the other way around! I think he's been eyeing my things. In fact, my newly gifted Alpha bucket hat is currently nowhere to be found.

What is the best part about showing up to a chapter meeting and seeing your own flesh and blood across the room?

Kelvin: It's the immense pride of watching my son develop into a caring, compassionate, and dedicated young man. There is no greater reward than stepping into that space not just as his father, but as his brother, working side-by-side to impact our community.

Micah: It's nice. It gives me an additional feeling of safety and grounding that only being around your father can provide.

The Fortress of Stone

The Strategic Foresight of Bro. Milton Carver Davis and the Preservation of the King Memorial

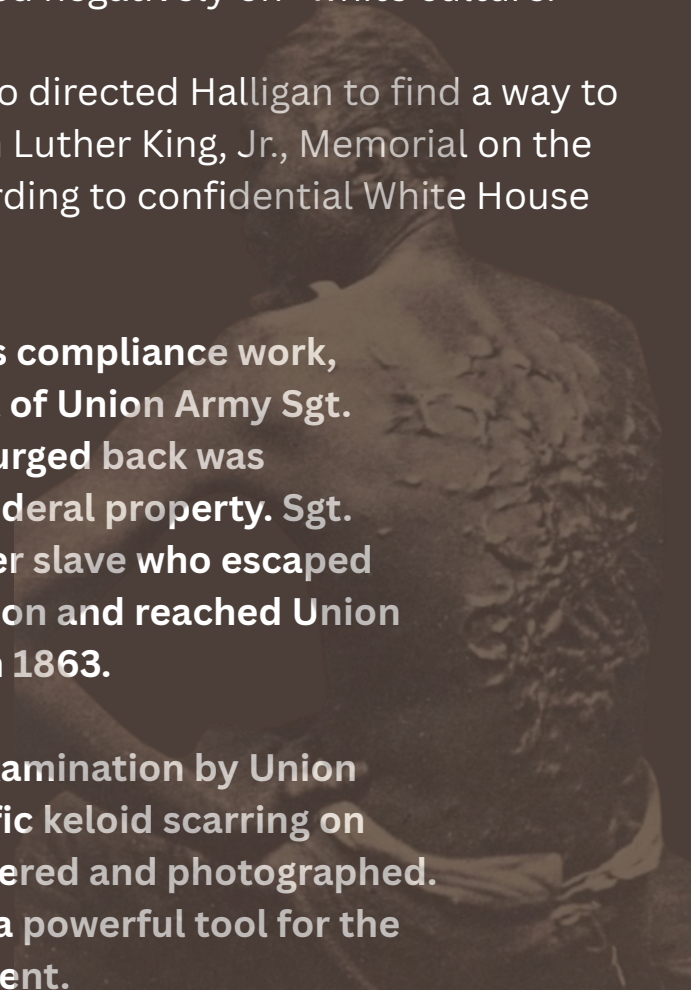
In April 2025, President Donald Trump tasked Lindsey Halligan, a White House Special Assistant and former personal attorney, with leading an effort to remove what Trump called "divisive race-centered ideology" from the Smithsonian's 21 museums, the National Art Gallery, the National Zoo, and the National Museum of African American History and Culture.

Trump instructed Halligan to remove any content or artifact that reflected negatively on "white culture."

Privately, Trump also directed Halligan to find a way to get rid of the Martin Luther King, Jr., Memorial on the National Mall, according to confidential White House sources.

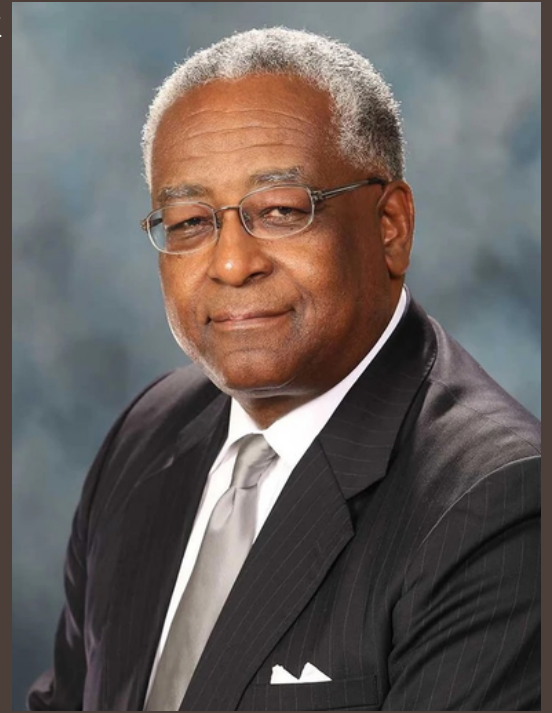
As part of Halligan's compliance work, the famous portrait of Union Army Sgt. Peter Gordon's scourged back was removed from all federal property. Sgt. Gordon was a former slave who escaped a Louisiana plantation and reached Union Army lines in March 1863.

During a medical examination by Union surgeons, the horrific keloid scarring on his back was discovered and photographed. The image became a powerful tool for the abolitionist movement.



Removing the King Memorial Became an Impossible Task

The King Memorial presented Halligan and Trump with a daunting challenge for two reasons. First, Dr. King is a national hero. Second, Milton Carver Davis, Alpha Phi Alpha's 29th General President, structured the King Memorial deal from 1993 to 1996 in a such way that no future racist U.S. President could remove the Memorial.



On July 21, 2025, Trump released the classified files on Dr. King's 1968 assassination in the hope that they would smear King in some way. Trump planned to use the anticipated smear as a pretext for removing the King Memorial.

The release of the documents failed to produce a public backlash against Dr. King.

Privately, Trump detests Dr. King. On March 2, 2024, Trump declared that North Carolina gubernatorial candidate, porn addict, scammer, and serial liar Mark Robinson is "Martin Luther King on steroids." Trump has now distanced himself from Robinson.

Davis' Brilliance Made the King Memorial "Untouchable"

Trump's plan to remove the King Memorial failed because Milton Carver Davis, who is a visionary leader, a brilliant strategist, and superb lawyer, knew how to secure the King Memorial against political regression, chaos in government, and future racist actors in the White House. Davis made the King Memorial "untouchable."

The \$120 million Memorial was constructed by Alpha Phi Alpha with private donations. The federal government's contribution to the project was limited to \$10 million. Davis always kept control of the project in the hands of Alpha Phi Alpha, no matter who is U.S. president.

For all practical purposes, the King Memorial is a privately-owned memorial on public land that is open to the public, forever. It is Alpha Phi Alpha's biggest gift to the free world.

Davis' Knowledge of History Guided His Deal-Making Strategy

Davis, a Tuskegee, Alabama native and expert in American history, knew that the U.S. government broke every one of the 500+ treaties it executed with Native American tribes between 1778 and 1871.

He also witnessed the severe harm inflicted by the U.S. government on 623 unsuspecting black men in the Tuskegee Syphilis Study that ran from 1932 to 1972.

Finally, Davis was the Assistant Attorney General for the state of Alabama whose archival research and personal review of 45 years of legal documents and evidence paved the way for "Scottsboro Boy" Clarence Norris to get a full and unconditional pardon on November 29, 1976, based upon his innocence in this rape case.

Unable to circumvent the ironclad legal protections Milton Davis draped around the King Memorial in Washington, Trump moved on to his dubious White House Ballroom project, which he announced on July 31, 2025.

Trump's oversized ego has made the Ballroom a \$1 billion project because it must be bigger than the King Memorial. Of course, taxpayers are footing the bill for Trump's Ballroom project.

Davis has never gotten the credit that his leadership and brilliance deserve, but he is getting it now. Thank you, Milton Carver Davis!

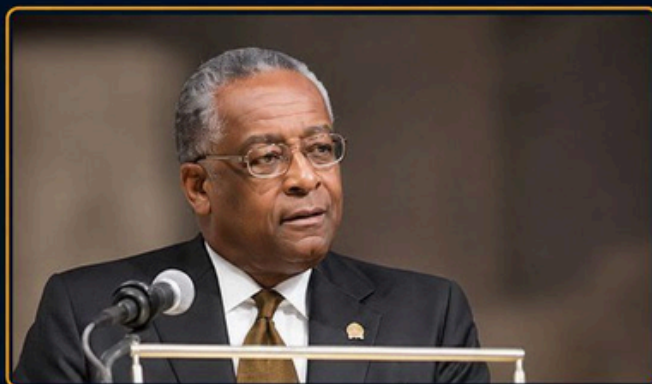

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Manly Deeds on the Move

How Brother Brian Watts Blends Business and Fraternal Service

STARVE THE MACHINE:

A Call for Economic Resistance

Many will scroll past this post because it lacks the hollow drama or viral distractions that dominate our feeds today. However, what follows is far more significant than temporary entertainment.

This is not a grievance; it is a blueprint.

I ask you to read, internalize, and distribute the attached document. Our future belongs to those who are informed, organized, and capable of looking beyond the noise.

No Representation, No Revenue

Over the past few weeks, I have offered public critiques of institutions I hold dear. I have challenged the Black Church, the National Baptist Convention, and the Alabama State

Democratic Committee—not as an adversary, but as an ordained minister, a product of our tradition, and a lifelong activist. I critique these entities because I believe in their capacity for greatness, and I refuse to settle for the weak, reactive politics that currently leave our collective power under assault.

I apply that same standard today to the NAACP.

I deeply respect the NAACP's history of litigation, advocacy, and civil rights leadership. It is precisely because the organization is so vital that it cannot afford to be timid in this moment.

The NAACP's "Out of Bounds" campaign rightly identifies the contradiction of Southern public universities profiting from Black athletic labor while their states dismantle Black political representation.

By urging athletes to boycott these institutions, the NAACP has established a morally valid premise. However, the scope of this crisis demands more.



This is not the hour for cautious symbolism, nor is it the time to place the full burden of resistance upon the shoulders of young Black student-athletes. While we look to them to take the lead, our churches, fraternities, sororities, Masonic bodies, professional athletes, entertainers, donors, and consumers remain largely undisturbed.

This is an all-hands-on-deck crisis.

If the former Confederate South intends to attack Black and brown political power while continuing to extract profit from our labor, our culture, our church deposits, our tourism, and our viewership, our response must match the scale of the provocation. It must be:

- **Economic** in its target.
- **Disciplined** in its execution.
- **Measurable** in its results.
- **Lawful** in its operation.
- **Sustained** until the status quo is forced to change.

The NAACP's call must be the beginning, not the conclusion. We must adopt a comprehensive doctrine of economic resistance:

No Representation, No Revenue. No fair maps, no conventions. No voting power, no entertainment. No political respect, no tourism. No Black and brown representation, no Black and brown money.

As members of Alpha Phi Alpha, we are called to be leaders in the struggle for human rights and dignity. Given the strategy outlined above, what are the most effective ways for our fraternity to leverage our institutional influence to enforce this doctrine of economic resistance?
