## COL. PERCY L. BLACKMON, JR., US ARMY (RET.)

Percy Lee Blackmon, Jr. was born May 16, 1949 in Carroll County, MS to the late Percy Lee Blackmon, Sr. and Leola Green Blackmon.

At an early age, Percy accepted Christ as his personal Savior by becoming a member of Jeff Chapel CME Church. His acceptance of a walk with God continued to grow as he and family always joined and worshiped in local churches wherever they lived. Having been a member of Clinton Chapel A.M.E. Zion Church since the early 1980's, Percy served in many capacities including Chairman of the Trustee Board for over ten years. His love for the Church propelled him to become the volunteer janitor and yard maintenance person. Percy was a devout Christian who served whenever or wherever he was need.

Percy attended Black Hawk School and graduated Valedictorian of the North Vaiden High School class of 1967. He continued his formal education at Alcorn State University (ASU) in Lorman, MS graduating with honors with a B.S. degree in Mathematics in 1971. Later he obtained a Master's in Public Administration from Auburn University Montgomery. Percy was a scholar who believed that education was key to a successful career path in life.

Percy began his professional career with the Social Security Administration (SSA) as a Claims Representative Trainee in the Greenwood, Mississippi District Office. Shortly after completing technical training, he was drafted by the United States Army but enlisted instead for a two-year tour of duty and returned to the SSA in 1974 in Opelika, Alabama. In 1977, he was promoted to the Operations Supervisor position in Alexander City, Alabama. Percy loved being a public servant and worked hard to ensure that all whom he served was better off by having crossed his path. Completing a 39-year career, in 2010 Percy retired as the District Manager of the Social Security Administration in Selma, Alabama leaving a legacy of exceptional service and mentorship of future managers. Percy was a hard worker who shared his knowledge with others, serving as a mentor to many people.

Percy's life calling of service continued through his military career. He served with pride and honor in the United States Army, Alabama National Guard and the United States Army Reserves. In 2009, he retired as a Colonel from the United States Army after 37 years of service that included serving as an artillery officer and later as a logistician and operations officer. His active duty service included tours in Germany, Belgium, and several South American countries including Panama and Honduras. Percy loved his country which propelled him to serve with honor in the military for 37 years.

Percy was taught and accepted that his life purpose was service. He exemplified the quote, "Service is the rent we pay for being. It is the very purpose of life, and not something you do in your spare time". Over his lifetime, he humbly gave thousands of hours in volunteer service never seeking public acknowledgement. Service to all mankind was Percy's way of life as evidenced by his work in every community in which he lived. His community service included, but not limited to the United States Army Field Artillery Association, Alabama National Guard Officers Association, Military Officers Association of America, April 1865 Society, Kiwanis Club, Alcorn State University Alumni Association, Auburn University Alumni Association, United Way Boards of Director in Alexander City, AL and Montgomery, AL, Boy Scouts of America Board, and a life member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Incorporated. Upon retirement, Percy volunteered to assist the widows of Alpha Upsilon Omega Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity with any yard work, transportation and other requested services. He also volunteered to help his wife with Meals on Wheels. He regularly called and visited all whom he loved and felt has a need that he could provide. Traveling and visiting new places was his passion, always interested in the history of the places he visited and excited to meet new people.

Percy was the patriarch of the Blackmon Family. Family was the most important thing to him. He modeled his roles as husband, father, grandfather, great grandfather, brother, uncle, nephew, cousin and friend with unconditional love. He was a supporter, protector, provider, encourager, and when need be, peacemaker or voice of reason. He saw purpose and value in everyone, especially youth; inspiring his nieces, nephews and all youths to seek an education and strive for greatness. There was no celebration or life changing event that was too small for Percy; he was always there as the head cheerleader. Percy had a genuine love of family and demonstrated it when mentoring them on life choices or helping them when there was a crisis in their lives. He was happiest when he could give rather than receive, often saying what a blessing it was to do for others.

Percy met his best friend and the love of his life, Zenobia "Zee" Lumbus to whom he married October 27, 1971, becoming team, "Percy and Zee". Over their 42 years of marriage they were blessed to raise four children and extend their family pride with five grandchildren and one great granddaughter, but always stayed true to their marriage covenant of "one".

Percy was preceded in death by his parents, Percy Lee Blackmon, Sr. and Leola Green Blackmon. He is survived by his wife Zenobia (Zee)Montgomery, AL; children, Jeffrey Blackmon (Tonya) Montgomery, AL, Jennifer Blackmon, Atlanta, GA, Jared Blackmon (Audrey), Atlanta, GA and Victoria Campbell (Jarel) Charlotte, NC; five grandchildren, Odessa, Jeffrey Steven, Courtney, Zoe and Dominic; and one great granddaughter, Makynlee; eleven siblings; Earl G.
